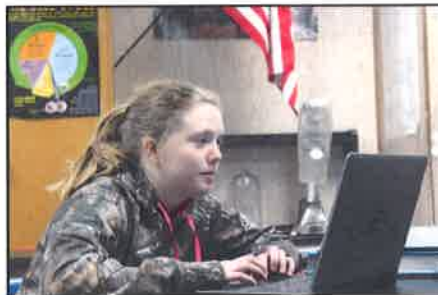

News from the Superintendent

At this time of the school year, we are reviewing our mid-year test scores and planning instruction accordingly. Teachers have found successes! Several elementary grades are reporting more students who score at a proficient level or higher. What is really impressive, is the fourth grade, where every single student scored proficient or higher in language usage. At the high school, the freshmen made the most progress in reading. Unfortunately there was a decline in math scores at the junior class level, but our math teacher is planning on an increase in scores this spring.

Graduation requirements may change. A task force of 5 people are meeting to discuss what changes should be proposed. The task force will make a recommendation to the school board at the February board meeting. Changing the requirements must have board approval and would begin no sooner than next school year. The suggestions have been to lower the number of total credits, to lower the math requirements, and to remove Careers as a specific course requirement. Efforts are being made to create policies that will no longer punish students by withholding credit due to absences, since we allow students to make up for their absences.

Our new school nurse, Mrs. Amy Henke, has been busy setting up dental checks for all our students. Next, we will test students' vision and hearing. These screenings are just that...undetailed screenings. They can alert parents to serious issues that will need to be followed up by the parent with a medical professional. By law, grades K-4, 7, and 10 are required to go through the screenings, but because we have skipped some years in the past, we will screen all students this year. If you receive a letter from the nurse about the results of a screening and have questions about it, please don't hesitate to call Mrs. Henke at the elementary school in Gurley.

Many good things continue to happen at Leyton Public Schools. Art students have begun a unit in ceramics and will create pottery. Ninth grade science students have studied sound by watching the wavelengths of sounds from the Blue Man group. Social science students will video interviews with veterans to learn about the wars. Fourth graders presented a play on Cherokee Indians. Fifth graders are preparing for the Wax Museum, an afternoon of personifying historical characters; with one touch, spectators can awaken the "wax" students.

The chef salads at high school lunch time have been such a big hit, the high school kitchen orders three times as much lettuce as last year. This pilot project began in December, and now, 20-35 chef salads are ordered per day. The new salad bar table at the elementary school has offered students an array of healthy choices, and students enjoy acting like they are in a restaurant when they serve themselves from it

Since we are deep in the middle of flu season, custodians wipe the desk tops, chairs, and counters of all classrooms with a disinfectant cleaner on a daily basis. The disinfectant kills bacteria and viruses including specific strains of dangerous flu viruses.

Ms. Miller reported on the status of the 504 plans that have been received. She also reported on her accumulated work days as per her contract.


TIME AND DATE OF NEXT REGULAR MEETING:

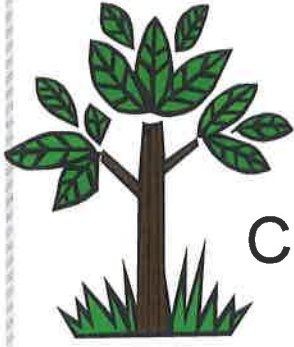
We wanted to thank all the families for sending money with their children so they could purchase items from PAC's Christmas Store!

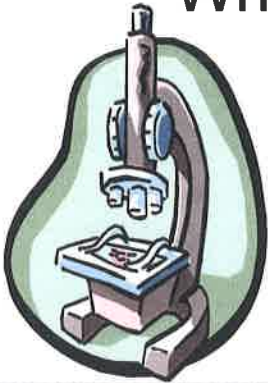

Should I keep my child home?

As many of you know, there has been a lot of illness at school and in the community. In a perfect world, kids would never get sick, and they'd never miss a day of school. But it's not a perfect world. Kids get sick all the time, and they love to share their little germs with everyone around them, especially this time of year.

It's not uncommon for children to get viral illnesses 10 to 12 times per year, and these symptoms can last a week or more. When kids are sick, parents are faced with a difficult decision: Send the children to school or day care, or keep them home?

This can be such a tough decision because there are a lot of conflicting priorities to consider. We all want our children to feel better and recover quickly, and we don't want them to get other kids sick. But we also want them in school so that their education doesn't suffer - and so that we don't have to miss work or struggle to find last-minute child care.

It's not always an easy call, but here are some things to consider. Children need to be healthy to learn, and need to learn to be healthy. I hope this will help you make the right decision to provide the best learning environment for your child.

How sick is your child?

Can your child participate in the activities at school? Kids go to school to learn. If your child is so uncomfortable, sleepy or otherwise distracted that he/she wouldn't be able to get anything out of school, it may be better to keep your child at home. In some cases, children are fine to sit in class but may have trouble with gym or other demanding activities. In those cases, a note from you or your doctor asking for temporary accommodations may be helpful.

Will your kid get others sick? And if so, how big a deal would that be? The answer to the first question is probably yes, but it's important to think about the second question, too. Many childhood illnesses are contagious, but they're not all equally dangerous. Sharing pinkeye or lice is a lot different from sharing measles or whooping cough. If you are unsure, ask your pediatrician if your child can go to school.

Here are some common illnesses we see at school. If your child is not feeling his/her best, please call or send a note so that we can help your child get the best learning experience throughout the day.

Colds/sore throats/etc.: These illnesses are common and usually on the milder side. They'll probably get passed around, but we just can't keep kids out of school every time they have a stuffy nose. Kids should go to school as long as symptoms aren't severe enough to keep them from participating.

Conjunctivitis/pinkeye: Conjunctivitis is just inflammation of the eye, and it can be caused by a lot of different things: viruses, allergies and (more rarely) bacteria. Many of these cases are viral and don't require treatment: Yes, it can be spread, but we can't do anything about it aside from teaching good

hand hygiene. For cases thought to be caused by bacteria, children can return to school after antibiotic drops are started.

Ear infections: Ear infections are contained within the middle ear and aren't typically contagious. They may or may not need antibiotic treatment, but kids should go to school unless they are so miserable they wouldn't be able to participate.

Rash: Rashes can be caused by all kinds of things. Some are contagious and some aren't. In general, a child whose only symptom is a rash is okay to go to school.

Influenza or flulike illnesses: Influenza can be pretty serious and spreads easily. Children should stay home from school and return **only after being fever-free without medication for 24 hours.**

Strep throat: Kids who have a sore throat and a positive strep test should **stay out of school until they've been on antibiotics for 24 hours.**

Vomiting: If kids are vomiting twice or more in 24 hours, they should stay home from school until their symptoms resolve.

Children are very good at sharing, and swap germs in the crowded indoor environment of school. Our janitorial staff works diligently to assure the spread of illnesses remains minimal. With your help, we can do a few things to minimize the damage:

Immunize. There's a reason that vaccines are required for school attendance. It's because they're an effective way to prevent some serious, potentially life-threatening diseases.

Wash your hands. I have taught proper handwashing to several classes this year. Good hand washing is probably the best way to limit the spread of disease. Hand sanitizer is okay for most germs, but soap and water are more effective against many viruses. It doesn't have to be antibacterial soap, and it doesn't have to be hot water. Teach your children how to wash properly: Scrub both sides of their hands and between their fingers and under their nails for at least 20 seconds. Try washing while singing ABC's or by singing "Happy Birthday" two times. Dry with a paper towel and use the towel to turn off the sink and open the door.

Cover your mouth. Many respiratory illnesses are spread by coughing or sneezing. Teach children to cover their mouths with a tissue, elbow or shoulder - not their hand.

Reminder!!

If your child is not feeling his/her best, please call or send a note so that we can help your child get the best learning experience throughout the day. And, as stated in the student handbook, students will be sent home for a temperature greater than 100°F, vomiting, diarrhea, unexplained rashes and live head lice.

1. **Game Clock:** Games consist of two 20 minute halves. The clock will run, except for the last 2 minutes of both halves. If a team is ahead by more than 20 points at anytime during the last 2 minutes, the clock will run.
2. **Overtime:** All overtimes will consist of three minute periods with clock stopping with fouls and violations in the last one minute.
3. **Time Outs:** Each team will be given 2 time outs (1 minute) per half and they will not carry over. In case of overtime, 1 extra time out will be given.
4. **Team Fouls:** Players will be given 5 fouls per game. Bonus shots will be given after the 7th team foul and the team will be in double bonus after the 10th team foul, per half.

5. Technical Fouls: All technical fouls will account for a personal foul. A player who receives a technical foul must sit out of the game for three minutes off the game clock before he/she will be allowed back into the game. If a player receives a second technical foul during the same game the player will be ejected from the tournament.
6. 3-Pointers: High School 3-point line will be utilized in all games.
7. Pressing: Full Court pressing is allowed.

Conduct

1. All participants; coaches and spectators shall refrain from using profanity or verbal abuse towards other players, coaches, spectators, referees, and tournament staff.
2. Team coaches will be responsible for the conduct of their players. Teams and spectators shall abide by tournament rules and regulations.
3. The Tournament Director and Staff are not responsible for any personal items left behind, lost, or stolen.

Fighting

1. Fighting is an attempt to strike an opponent with arms, hands, legs, feet, or combative action by one or more players, a coach, or other team personnel. Any member or team personnel who participate in a fight shall be immediately suspended from the game for the duration of the game and possible for future games to be determined by tournament director.
