#### A note from the Superintendent

A school's first job is to keep the students safe at all times. I think we can all agree on that. Every day we send our students to Leyton Public Schools, we want to be sure they are safe and cared for by the staff at our school. As a school, we put measures in place that address the needs of all students to help our families transition their students into productive members of the world we live in. I wanted to spend some time with this month's newsletter to review some of the important initiatives that we have as a school to address the challenges we are facing in society today. Our community should know that our school has done a lot of work to address the safety and well-being of our students and I wanted to highlight a few of those initiatives that we use to be proactive in our approach to safety, security, and well-being. It's important to note that we need everyone in our communities to take part in ensuring that safety is our top priority.

The building blocks within our school start with our Social Emotional Programming which is taught by our school counselor Ms. Primm. Each student receives instruction with a curriculum called 7 Mindsets which gives our elementary and junior high a common language within the building. If we are noticing issues with students who might not be successful socially and emotionally we have a process to determine further support needed for each student, whether that is counseling, positive reinforcements, behavior sheets and many more. The key is that we know and understand where students are coming from and how to address their individual needs. If students are experiencing bullying we have SafeSchools Tip reporting on our website to anonymously report issues to help our staff address situations. Finally, we have a School Resource Officer employed by us, on campus one day a week to help us with a variety of issues that students may face.

We teach our students effective coping strategies and life skills, and work on our district culture consistently but safe students also need to know what to do in the case of an emergency. Over the last two weeks our buildings have participated in some required safety drills. We utilize the "I love you guys" protocol as our standard response protocol at the school. This training relies on what to do in the event of an emergency from chemical spills to evacuations to unsafe people on campus. We rely on common language to respond to emergencies and train our staff and students to respond accordingly. This is extremely important for all of our community to hold each other accountable to do better each day so that our kids are prepared for emergencies.

The message for this month from me is that we are working hard to ensure safety within and around our community, but we can always do better to keep safety our first priority. If you have any suggestions for improvements or would like to become more involved with our school as far as safety goes please feel free to call me at the school.

#### **April News Letter**

The staff continues to read the book "Chop Wood and Carry Water" by Joshua Medcalf. The book is a short read and talks about the process of becoming great. It is an inspirational book and it's easy to read, not to mention the many great ideas to ponder as you read.

The next few chapters in the book continue to hammer home the concept of chopping wood and carrying water. This phase means that in order to become great at your chosen profession you must always practice the fundamentals, the small things you can control. The staff read several chapters this month. I would like to share Medcalf's advice on goals and missions.

I have always been told you need to set a goal or goals in order to succeed at work and in life. I have never been told to create a life mission. Medcalf suggests to set a life mission and forget about having goals. He says if you set a specific goal there are many obstacles that can stop you from attaining that goal. For example, if your goal is to become a lawyer that requires you to go to many years of school and take a lot of tests. You will encounter obstacles that can stop you dead in your tracks, like failing a test, getting sick, or others telling you it can't be accomplished because you're not smart enough.

On the other hand, if your life mission is to help others, to serve the needs of others no one can stop you, except yourself. There are many ways to accomplish this mission, by being a lawyer, a doctor, a teacher, a farmer, or an Uber driver. Each one of these professions serves the needs of other people. If you fail or succeed at some point in your journey, there will be other options you can pursue. Mother Theresa's mission in life was "to serve the needs of the sick and dying". No one could stop her from attaining that mission, as there are many people in need. Goals allow you to escape from reaching your potential as a person, a scapegoat if you will. If you fail to reach one goal is that the end? A mission however, allows you to be flexible and find many different paths to be successful. Hopefully your journey or mission is your focus. It will be the journey not the destination that matters. At the end of your journey may you be able to say I made a difference during my life. Medcalf says "no one on their death bed is worried about how many points they scored in a game or if they made the winning touchdown or how much money they made in their lifetime. They care about who they have become, what kind of a person they are, and their relationships with others."

This reminds me of a saying I have seen a time or two that goes something like this: "When you were born you cried and the world rejoiced. Live your life so that when you die, you rejoice and the world cries."

And so Warrior Nation, keep on chopping wood and carrying water. Think about setting a mission. A mission that allows you to rejoice at the end of your journey.

#### Leyton High School Chapter of the National Honor Society Selection Process

As outlined in Section 3 of the Leyton High School NHS Bylaws, students will be selected using the following process:

#### Section 3 Selection of Members

- 1. Members of the NHS must be of the current sophomore, junior, and senior class.
- 2. The student to be considered for selection must have been in attendance at Leyton Public schools for at least one semester: if less than one semester, a recommendation from the previous school can waive this requirement if approved by the principal.
- 3. Candidates must have a cumulative GPA of at least 3.5 on a 4.0 point scale.
- 4. Criteria for selection will be published in the student handbook and a complete selection procedure will be made available to parents and students upon request.

#### 5. Steps for selection:

- A) All candidates must meet the GPA requirement and receive a nomination from a LHS teacher or administrator.
- B) Once nominated, candidates must fill out all forms describing their leadership, service, and character experiences and qualities. (Or submit a resume with this information.)
- C) The faculty council will evaluate the applicants on three categories of leadership, service, and character on a scale of 1-4.
- D) Candidates must participate in a formal interview with select members of the faculty council.
- E) The final selection of each member to the Leyton chapter of NHS shall be a majority vote of the faculty council.
- F) Candidates who are not selected, will receive a notification letter from the NHS sponsor.
